The Holy Spirit in Ordinary Time

Grace and Peace to you; and Happy Summer!!

This past Sunday (May 28th) we celebrated the day of Pentecost with readings about tongues of fire, great gales of wind, speaking in different languages and the giving of the Holy Spirit to the disciples. Pentecost is often referred to as the birthday of the Christian church because the scene from Acts, chapter 2, is the moment that the Good News of Christ was heard by people other than the Jews and carried back to those places; in short, it was the moment that belief in Jesus as the Messiah grew from a small movement within Judaism to a global movement.

The reading itself is an exciting one: you've got an international group of people, the Holy Spirit blowing through the place, tongues of flame, and disciples who seem to be drunk. Amazing. Exciting! As wonderful as the day of Pentecost is, it is important to ask the question: what happens after all the excitement?

What happens after the Gospel has been proclaimed in the language of all those present? What happens after they go back to their own lands and back to their own routines? What happens when the Holy Spirit has stopped her dancing and her blowing and has settled into our hearts for the day-to-day work of faith? The day of Pentecost is the beginning of an entire season in the church calendar, often called "ordinary time". During this season the readings speak to us about Jesus' work in the world, God's relationship with the world and our calling to be the body of Christ in the world. It is the season where we really dig into what it means to live "filled with the Holy Spirit" (John 20:22, Acts 2: 4).

The first thing we need to remember is that "ordinary time" doesn't mean boring. Holy Spirit might not be setting things on fire or stirring up windstorms, but that doesn't mean she isn't working or moving. That is, in many ways, the beauty of this season of the church year; we are invited to see how God is working and moving within and through the normal, ordinary, experiences of life. When we stop to remember that we are, always, infused with the Holy Spirit we can see everyday actions of love as extraordinary. We can see our part in God's work. When we remind ourselves to look for the Holy in the everyday, we see those moments when God was at work in our lives, we recognize the people who were angels unaware, bringing God's love home to us when we needed it.

The second thing we need to remember is that being called to share the good news requires nothing other than our own openness to God's work in our lives. We do not have to wait for a perfect time when we have accomplished more, or when we have learned more, or when we feel that we have it "together" more. The Holy Spirit resides in us when we are at the best possible place in our life AND when we are not. The Holy Spirit works and dwells among communities when they are at their best AND when they are not.

And Beloved, this might just be the most radical truth of all.

In a society where perfection is almost required; when we are inundated with social media representations of perfect people doing perfect things and "living your best life" seems to mean being perfectly fit, perfectly able, perfectly rich, perfectly beautiful, and perfectly able to balance everything; accepting that God works in us, that God is present in us, when we are at our least perfect is an act of radical defiance.

The truth of it is that behind the perfectly polished images our society puts out, we are a deeply broken community. Civility and kindness and the ability to disagree with love have become rare. There are efforts to deny rights and even personhood and dignity to some of our siblings in Christ, and more people than ever suffer from loneliness despite being more technologically connected than ever.

This is our ordinary. It is messy, and complicated, and it is full of joy and full of sorrow. The radical, amazing, life-changing good news is that God is present in the messy, and the complicated. God celebrates our Joy and comforts us in our sorrow. God invites us to share this radical good news, invites us to gather at our most messy and ordinary and calls us to invite others at their most messy and ordinary so that together, we may experience the life-giving good news of Jesus.

Go in peace--knowing that Holy Spirit is at work in you—to see God in the ordinary, to be the body of Christ in the everyday, to know extraordinary love in this ordinary time.




We are once again the turn around point for the Pride 5k. We will be handing out water and cheering on the runners/walkers.

BestPals Animal Rescue Center – Our Story



BestPals Animal Rescue Center is a non-profit shelter in Holland that takes in owner-surrendered cats and dogs. Our mission is to provide a guaranteed adoption for owner-surrendered companion animals and to partner with other organizations to provide a No-Kill community. We also take in transfers from local overcrowded shelters when we can. We provide a service to our community's homeless animal population that other organizations can't. We are a No-Kill Promise shelter, committed to finding a forever home for every animal that enters our doors. Most of the cats and dogs come to us in need of necessary and immediate medical treatment. As a small shelter, a large part of our donations go to emergency veterinary care for the animals we take in.

Founded 10 years ago, our Executive Director, Michelle Kenat, realized her lifelong dream to have a shelter where cats and dogs could be loved and cared for in a no-kill environment. Her love for animals led her to work in shelters in her home town of Chicago. After moving to Holland, she was able to put her plans for BestPals into place.

We believe that every companion animal should have a forever home where they are loved and cherished. Sadly, this is not always the case. Many shelters are paid by their county to take in strays, but they do not have to accept owner-surrendered pets. BestPals focuses on the owner-surrenders, the ones that no one else will take and, because we are a no-kill shelter, every dog and cat will remain with us until they are adopted. We will always take a pet back if the owner is no longer able to care for them. Our surrender program is judgement free. We work with pet owners to find solutions to keep or take back their pets if possible. BestPals' adoption process is stringent. We check every potential adopter to ensure they can and will take care of their new best pal. All pet adoptees are fostered by the potential adopter first, prior to the adoption, to ensure a good fit for the pet and the adopter.

BestPals has been voted Holland's "Best Of The Best" of all non-profit organizations the last 7 years in a row. It is truly a testament of our dedication to the cats and dogs we serve every day.

PLASTIC BAG AND METAL RECYCLING

As we continue to take care of our planet and reduce our impact on the environment, we wanted to share some information on how to recycle plastic bags and metal in the Holland/Zeeland area.

Plastic bags are not accepted in your curbside recycling bin because they can get tangled in the machinery at the recycling facility. However, you can recycle them at some local grocery stores, such as Meijer and Walmart. Look for a collection bin near the entrance of the store and drop off your clean and dry plastic bags there. This includes grocery bags, bread bags, and even plastic wrap from items like paper towels and toilet paper.

For metal recycling, there are options through the county you can find on the Ottawa County website (miottawa.org). Another option is the Padnos Black River Recycling center on Chicago Drive in Holland. Black River will offer a small amount of cash to recycle many types of scrap metal with them. Some appliances may have a fee if there are hazardous chemicals that require disposal. For appliances like refrigerators, you may want to check with your utility company. Consumers Energy will pick up full size refrigerators and freezers for free at your home and also offers a \$50 rebate on top. These must be plugged in and working at time of pick-up. If you would like to support a local crafter, you can drop off your metal scraps to Scrapper Joe at 426 Main Ave in Zeeland. He typically has a trailer in his front yard for drop offs. If you get a chance to meet him, he's a very friendly man who has spent decades keeping metal out of landfills and upcycling the material.

We encourage everyone to do their part in reducing waste and conserving resources by recycling whenever possible. Thank you for your commitment to a healthier planet.
