In the service of Holy Baptism for children, there is a section where the responsibilities of the parents and sponsors, along with the entire faith community are laid out. These responsibilities include bringing the child(ren) to worship and other activities within the faith community, teaching the child(ren) about the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer along with the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion, praying for them and the responsibility to "place in their hands the holy scriptures." If you have many Bibles you could choose to bring the one that has the most meaning for you or the one you use the most. During worship, all of the Bibles will be blessed and we will engage in some fun scripture-related activities. Together we will place the holy scriptures in the hands of the children and share with them the joy of reading God's Word. We will bless one another and share our favorite passages and stories while the Holy Spirit opens us to God's Word for us and our community. Amen.

October Selection: Waves of Mercy by Lynn Austin



This book takes place in our own Holland, MI. It starts with Dutch people emigrating from the Netherlands and eventually settling in our area. Geesje de Jonge crossed the ocean at age seventeen with her parents and a small group of immigrants from the Netherlands to settle in the Michigan wilderness. Fifty years later, in 1897, she is asked to write a memoir of her early experiences as the town celebrates its anniversary. Reluctant at first, she soon uncovers memories and emotions hidden all these years, including the story of her one true love.

At the nearby Hotel Ottawa Resort on the shore of Lake Michigan, twenty-three-year-old Anna Nicholson is trying to ease the pain of a broken engagement to a wealthy Chicago banker. But her time of introspection is disturbed after a violent storm aboard a steamship stirs up memories of a childhood nightmare. As more memories and dreams surface, Anna begins to question who she is and whether she wants to return to her wealthy life in Chicago. When she befriends a young seminary student, Derek, who is working at the hotel for the summer, she finds herself asking him all the questions that have been troubling her. Derek introduces Anna to Geesje.

At BestPals We have many stories to tell. The greatest ones are about our relationship with our partners, like Good Shepherd Lutheran Church; working together for a common purpose to help all God's living creatures have safe and happy lives.

A little bit about us-

Together we Rescue!

BestPals is a 501(c)3 non-profit animal rescue. We are a no-kill promise volunteer run organization with no paid employees. We are successful in our mission to take in owner-surrendered cats and dogs and our community understands we are here to help and share the responsibility of saving lives. It is a happy ending for the intake pet who is given all the medical attention they need, is loved, trained, and nurtured until adoption. After adoption, we remain available to the adoptive family.

Since opening our doors in 2013, we have rescued over eight hundred homeless cats and dogs, and we have increased our annual rescue numbers year after year. We are one of only two animal shelters approved by the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development in Ottawa County. As a testament to our community, BestPals has won the Best of the Best of all non-profits in our area for the last 8 years.

FROM OUR STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Stewardship of the Earth – Thoughts on Electric Vehicles (EVs)

When I was on the market for a new vehicle last year, I was motivated to find an EV. Continuing to use a non-hybrid SUV was weighing on me given rapid global warming. I wanted to reduce my carbon footprint and take advantage of the energy our solar panels generate.

I test drove several EVs and found ones that were too small for me (most notably the Chevy Bolt) and several above my target price range. I ended up getting an offer from a coworker to directly purchase his 2019 Tesla Model 3 for just under \$25K because he wanted to upgrade to a newer, larger Tesla. So far, I am happy with the vehicle.

I was surprised that strangers come up to me and ask me about how I like my EV. I'm now comfortable addressing questions from the curious public about EVs. Here are a few common ones:

How do you charge at home?

I have so far been able to use just level 1 charging at a standard wall outlet because I have a short commute to work. This charges at a rate of 5 miles per hour. Most people with a 30+ minute commute will likely want a level 2 charger. Consumers Energy offered to subsidize installation of a level 2 charger at my home for about \$1000. A good option if I need it someday.

Is charging at home expensive?

Looking at my Consumers bills and my solar panel app, I estimate the cost of electricity is \$40-\$60 per month on average, which is at least a mild savings compared to what I was spending on my CR-V.

Is it difficult to travel longer distances?

The Tesla charging network is awesome. The car's navigation makes recommendations for where to stop for charging. Charging for about 30 minutes gets me from 10% to 80% battery life, which is about 200 miles of range and costs about \$16. (Note: it would be 200 miles of range if I drove ideally and didn't use energy for heating or cooling the cabin. In practice, you shave off 10-40% depending on how much extra energy you are consuming.) We rented a Subaru Solterra EV on a recent trip and found that using non-Tesla charging was slower and less reliable. Feel free to ask me for stories. I prefer the Tesla charging stations.

Does it lose charge in the winter?

I was surprised how well it did. Charge loss while sitting in the parking lot at work in the cold was very minor. Driving with the heater cranked up to full did consume charge quickly as noted in the previous answer.

Thoughts on Electric Vehicles (EVs) - Continued

What kind of maintenance does it need?

I've owned the car for nearly a year. We changed the tires shortly after purchase. The Michelins I bought do great. The only other maintenance it needed was the low voltage battery used for small electronics like the touchscreen and windows. The car and app told me the car needed maintenance. I clicked in the app, and it generated a quote for me for about \$110 to replace the low voltage battery. I scheduled a time for Tesla's field service to come to my house and replace it. I left the car in my driveway on the designated day. They messaged me on the way, came and switched out the battery in 10 minutes, and notified me afterward that the car was ready to go. The car hasn't needed anything else. It doesn't have an engine, so it doesn't need oil, spark plugs, belts, etc. I enjoy the low maintenance.

How does it drive?

I've driven several EVs. Some of them drive just like our CR-V or RAV-4. The Tesla is designed for 1-pedal driving. When you push the gas pedal, it goes (and accelerates fast). When you let off the gas pedal, the regenerative brake quickly slows down the vehicle. It still has a brake pedal and traditional brakes, but I only need to tap them occasionally. The regenerative brake takes the energy from the car's momentum and puts it back into the battery. Like a hybrid, it makes the car far more efficient in city driving. Though it can take a little more focus to maintain speed, the drive is enjoyable.

Overall, I have had a good experience with my Tesla Model 3 and would recommend it. I have mixed feelings about buying a new Tesla and putting more money in Elon Musk's pocket, but the used market for EVs is slowly improving. Other manufacturers are also moving to the Tesla charging network, which alleviates my concerns about their charging. EVs are getting more accessible to the American driver each year. Let me know if you have questions or want more stories!

Stewardship and Estimates of Giving

I want to thank all of you for your support of this congregation and its ministries. Just having this church building on this corner is in some ways a ministry in itself. Every time someone passes by the church building, hopefully, they will think about their relationship with God and that God wants all of us to love our neighbors.

Unless you have picked it up already, an envelope with your name on it is on the table in the commons. It contains an Estimate of Giving card and a letter telling about it. By filling out this card it allows you to consider how much of your time, talents, and treasures you are giving and how much you think you should be giving. Several in our congregation give very generously. For the church to give you a receipt of your financial contributions you will need to contribute using envelopes or on line. If you need help with this please see me.

All we need is an estimate of your contributions so a budget can be prepared. A budget is required to be sent to the Synod each year. The council has several projects it would like to initiate but without your financial support they won't come to fruition.

The card has a place to indicate how often you will be contributing the amount you write on the card. X52 means every week and X12 means every month. You get the idea. There has been some confusion about that in the past.

There is also a line to indicate your plan on giving your time and talents to the church's ministries. If you are unable to give your time or talent to the church's ministries now, that is OK. Some people physically cannot and some just can't work it into their busy schedule. But if you can give some time and talent it would be greatly appreciated. There are dozens of jobs that must be done to keep this facility and the congregation's ministries going. Lots of needed help is specified in the white pages each week. If one of those jobs are not something you are interested in doing just contact me or a council member and we will help find something for you to do.

During the Oct. 13th church service you may place your Estimate of Giving card in the offering plate with your weekly offering. If you are not able to attend the service please return your EOG card to the church office as soon as possible and preferably before October 13th.
